Lyme Central School update

Greetings to all!

I hope you have all enjoyed a wonderful holiday season with family and friends. There was much to be thankful for in 2023. I would like to begin by thanking our supportive community for passing our Capital Building Project vote back in the Fall. We had a very strong voter presence. There is much work ahead of us but it is with great anticipation that this work will be a tremendous asset to our staff, students, and community. Much of the work to be done involves replacing our heating and electrical systems, work that won't be visible at first glance. However, our gymnasium and main lobby, areas which we gladly share with our community partners, will undergo a much needed facelift. The process of getting plans approved by the State Education Department and then bidding for contractors and materials, slows down the actual work timeline. If all goes according to plan, we will break ground in summer 2025. We will continue to inform you of the progress we make once this needed renovation is underway.

We would also like to thank the Lyme Community Foundation (LCF) Board of Directors for collaborating with the school on a few initiatives over the past few months. With the help and support of the LCF, we were able to establish a community room, referred to as ***Billy's Closet***, that would be stocked with personal hygiene products, socks, gently worn or new clothes and outerwear, etc. Billy Patterson's sister, Reata, has successfully created a program at SMC in Billy's honor, and we would like to mirror this here at school for community/student use. The LCF will be assisting with the collection and donation of the supplies. Staff at school will also participate in providing donations. ***Billy's Closet*** is open and available for all students and community members. We think this is a wonderful opportunity to partner with the LCF and spread a little joy and kindness on behalf of Billy's legacy. The LCF also assisted the school with helping several of our families enjoy a wonderful turkey dinner with all the fixings at Thanksgiving and at Christmas.

It is times like these that we appreciate the benefit of

living, working, and participating in a small community where the support, care, and mutual respect for doing what is good and right brings us all together. It is our combined efforts and care for one another that makes this village and town such a wonderful place.

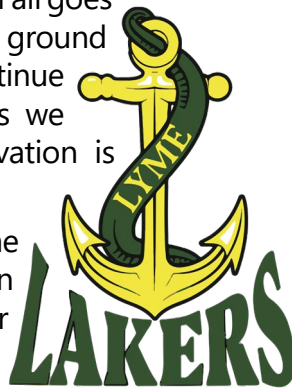
Thank you for all that you do to support our school and our community. We hope 2024 brings you much joy and happiness in the year to come.

Lyme Food Pantry

As 2023 has ended, the Lyme Food Pantry reviews the monthly food orders filled, the number of people receiving food, the monetary donations, the donated food and hygiene items and household cleaning items as well as Pantry expenses. We have all experienced budgets stressed with inflation. As a result, we have seen increased assistance requests. The Pantry shoppers try to get the best prices each week with sale items, coupons etc. and by shopping at various stores. Regardless of the cost, the Pantry has been able to completely fill a grocery cart for each order.



However in November after assisting 66 people with monthly orders and turkey dinner foods, the Pantry's shelves were very bare! Gratefully as always, community businesses and residents had food drives and donations quickly fully restocked the shelves and freezers!



Of course there was the Annual Christmas Food and Toy Give Away December 16th. The Presbyterian Church was stocked like a warehouse with many, many cases of food and fresh meat, milk, etc. Again community volunteers stepped up filling orders and distributing them.

As always how proud we are as a small community who cares about the Food Pantry to help those in need. For the 2023 year 261 orders were packed providing food for 574 people.

Meet Michele Bariteau

Michele Bariteau has been involved in the Lyme community for decades teaching music at Lyme Central School for 31 years and has continued to live in the area since retiring 5 years ago. She attended Roberts Wesleyan University, Rochester, NY receiving a degree in music education and flute.

What you may not know about Michele is that she is a seventh-generation teacher and second-generation music teacher of the Bariteau family. She is a north country gal from Hammond, NY, who has spent much of her life giving back. She is passionate about her music and is a talented flutist performing as a soloist with many area groups. Today, Jake is known as a local talent who plays both solo gigs as "Jake Savage Acoustic" and as a member of "The Bay Brothers", a 4-piece group made up of musicians from the local area. What you may not know about him is he is a successful

Architectural/Structural Designer who has worked for years in Central New York and the North Country. Currently Jake works for Aubertine and Currier, PLLC. Watertown, NY. He is a 2010 Lyme Central School graduate. He studied Civil Engineering at Clarkson University with concentrations in both Architectural and Structural Engineering. This unique 1890's property has been vacant since 1927. So, it is in great need of repair and restoration. It is a daunting task to bring this 15,000 sq ft home back to its former glory. Jake is excited to be on the team that works on making the historic preservation of Carleton Villa a success.

When talking about his music Jake has always enjoyed playing music and began performing as a side job or hobby. One gig led to another, and before he knew it, most of his weekends were booked. His involvement in the local music scene continues to evolve, developing into a network of friends with similar interests in music.

Jake loves the outdoors and is an avid fisherman and hunter. He keeps busy volunteering for the local town too. Since his return to the north county, he has been a member of the Town of Lyme Planning Board, sharing his planning expertise to improve the town we all love.

When asked about going to school at Lyme Central, Jake said the school was right sized for him and he valued the teachers' attention and support, it made all the difference for him. 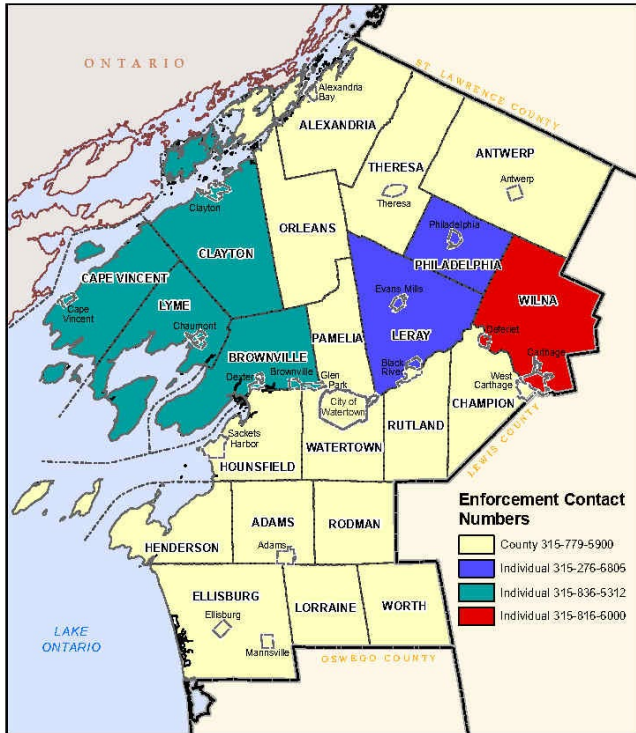
Information to note...

If you were unaware, Jefferson County is split into multiple districts when it comes to dog control. Back in the day (40 years ago) if a stray dog came into your yard, you simply called the county Dog Control and someone came to pick that dog up. Or if you lost your dog you called to the County Pound to see if anyone had brought your dog in.

Now the county is split into different areas with different officers covering different jurisdictions. The area for the Town of Lyme (as well as the towns of Cape Vincent, Clayton and Brownville) is covered by one person. If you have stray that appears, or have lost a dog, please contact Betsy Ring at (315) 836-5312.
