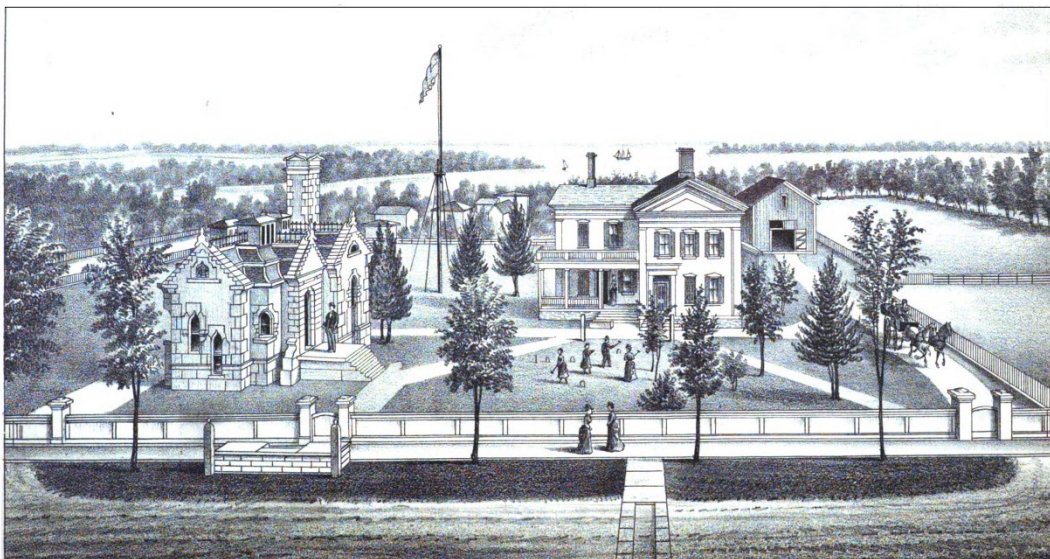

# Town of Lyme News

According to the calendar, it is the season of spring. Soon after that and we will be into the Summer. With the Summer, and before we know it, we will be celebrating 200 years of the Town of Lyme.

Plans for the Bicentennial Celebration are coming along nicely. The Bicentennial Celebration weekend will be July 27, 28 & 29. On the evening of Friday, July 27th, there will be a free ice cream social and a block dance with live music supplied by Rod Richmond and the Whitetail Band.

On Saturday, July 28th, free Zumba will be held in the TDS parking lot and the annual Community Days Craft Show will be on the grounds of the Lyme Community Foundation at the Copley House.

The Annual Antique Car Show will be exhibited all day long at the Chaumont Volunteer Fire Department. There will also be a Bicentennial Dedication Ceremony held on the town owned land next to the Chaumont Village Beach (time TBD). State and Local dignitaries will be present to recognize the Bicentennial occasion and also to commemorate the placement of a town monument, plaque and time capsule. Representatives from the towns of Cape Vincent and Clayton will also be invited as those two towns, in later years, seceded from the Town of Lyme to form their own townships.

Concerts at the Beach will begin at 5:00 pm with the sixteen piece big band music of the Arrhythmias playing at the Bicentennial Stage tent. The Arrhythmias Big Band was started by a group of Watertown doctors in 1977. Through the years many musicians have played with the group. They continue to play big band swing music for your dancing and listening pleasure.

At 6:30 pm, Blues recording artist Tas Cru will perform on the beach gazebo. Tas Cru (aka Rick Bates), a Three Mile Point resident, is an international touring and recording artist on the VizzTone label. His current album, *Simmered & Stewed* is a 2017 Syracuse Area Music Award (SAMMY – best blues album) winner and is nominated for a 2018 Blues Music Award by the International Blues Foundation, Memphis, Tennessee.

At 7:30 pm the concert will continue at the Bicentennial Stage tent with the music of the 10th Mountain Division Band. The Mission of the 10th Mountain Division band is to "provide music throughout the spectrum of military operations to instill in our soldiers the will to fight and win, foster the support of our citizens, and promote our national interests at home and abroad." The band has been deployed to nearly a dozen campaigns in support of our fighting troops. Following the concert will be the grand finale fireworks sponsored by the Chaumont/Three Mile Bay Chamber of Commerce.

A Parade, Carnival and Chicken Barbeque are schedule for Sunday, July 29th in Chaumont. The parade will begin at 1:00 pm at the Lyme Central School parking lot, march east down Academy Street and then down Madison Street to

Main Street. The parade will continue down Main Street past the Chaumont fire hall and down Circle Drive (past Valley Peetza) and into the Bicentennial Carnival grounds held at the fire hall. A detour route going down Morris Tract Road onto Van Alstyne Road into Depauville and onto Old Town Springs Road to Cheever Road and then onto Millens Bay Road will be available for traffic that does not wish to wait for the parade (and enjoys lovely, scenic drives).

In addition to the marching of the local area fire departments, local school bands, Boy and Girl Scout troops, dignitaries and Cape Vincent American Legion, we are asking, and encouraging, any business, club, organization, churches and individuals to march, enter a float or some other entry in the parade.

We are thrilled to announce the scheduled participation of two of the areas best known fife, drum and bugle corps. The Original Yanks Drum and Bugle Corps is one of the oldest American Legion Sponsored Senior Drum Corps in New York State. They have been performing at field days, festivals, parades and community events since 1956 and are still going strong. In addition to the Original Yanks, the Camden Continentals Fife and Drum Corps have agreed to march in the parade. The Camden Continentals did not actually begin in Camden. In 1850, an ancestor of current corps director Jeff Waterman, Alanson White organized a fife and drum corps in Taberg, NY. In high demand in their time, the Taberg Fife and Drum Corps played at political rallies and patriotic celebrations, including the inauguration of President Ulysses S. Grant. In 1947, the Corps moved to Camden and became the Camden Continentals. If we are lucky, the two Corps may agree to "muster" for a friendly time of sharing their musical abilities.

An old fashioned field days type carnival will be held on the back grounds of the Chaumont Volunteer Fire Department from 2:00 - 6:00 pm. Mechanical rides and bounce houses will be available. We are asking, and encouraging, any business, club, organization, churches and individuals to also plan, organize and operate a carnival game (ring toss, dunking booth, pop the balloon, etc.). Game operators may operate a game as a fund raiser. If you are interested in operating a game, contact Scott Aubertine at 315-767-8814. Also, if anyone wishes to operate some type of concession stand (fried dough, popcorn, cotton candy, etc.), that is also welcomed. The more community involvement we have, the less we have to pay the carnival owner to supply those games and concessions. Have a great spring!!

## Lyme Heritage Center News

The Lyme Heritage Center will open in May for the 2018 season. We have a huge array of historical and genealogical resources for visitors to browse. Among our most fascinating documents are copies of the Chaumont High School paper, "The Quill." The copies from 1933 and 1934 were professionally printed and are still clear. Later copies were produced in the school on a mimeograph machine and are faded and difficult to read. There are stories, poems, essays, book reports, and school news written by the students. There's also a Community Page in each issue; on the Community Page of December 1933 a headline reads:

"Library to move."

"The new home of the Chaumont Free Library will be ready about December 20, according to a statement issued by Leslie E. Daniels, vice president and acting president of the library corporation. The property, which is to be the new home of the library, was willed to it about two years ago, by Austin Rogers. It is now being remodeled and made suitable for the library.

The annual public meeting will be held during the first week in January. At that time three trustees are to be elected. Two of them are to fill the expired terms of Grace Adams and Leslie Daniels: one to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Charles W. Condon, who was the president of the corporation. As in the past, the library will be open on Wednesday and Saturday afternoons from 2:30 to 5:00 and on Wednesday and Saturday evening from 6:30 to 8:00."

Then from the February 1934 Quill:

"Chaumont Free Library is now located in its new home in the property which was recently given by Austin Rogers, a former resident of Chaumont, to be used for library purposes. At the present time one large room, made by taking out partitions, has been prepared.

The library property is one of the oldest buildings in Chaumont, having been built by Alexander Copley about 1836. At the annual meeting, Mrs. Roy Giles was elected to fill the unexpired term of Chas. W. Congdon. The officers of the board of trustees are Leslie Daniels, president; Grace Adams, vice-president; Ethel Case, secretary; Walter Van Doren, treasurer."

If your ancestors were from the Town of Lyme area, you would enjoy browsing these old school newspapers and learning about the school life in the 1930s.

We also have books and materials for sale. Our board members are busily preparing the 2019 historical calendar. This edition will feature historic Three Mile Bay houses. The 2018 historical calendar, spotlighting Chaumont historic homes, is still available for purchase in the Citizens Bank and the Lyme Free Library, or by contacting Shirley Williams at 315-649-5780.

### SPRING CLEANUP IS SCHEDULED FOR MAY 7<sup>TH</sup>, 2018

Items may be placed out to the curb on the weekend of May 5<sup>th</sup>. Pickup will be on Monday May 7<sup>th</sup>, 2018.

#### Acceptable items include:

Non-recyclables, metal, pots, pans, dishes, furniture & white goods. Electronic equipment and TV's. Construction materials under 3 ft. and paint cans that have been completely dried out.

#### The following items can not be included in spring cleanup:

Tires, Batteries, Car Parts, Boat Parts, Loose Glass, Door and Windows.

#### BRUSH PICKUP

Regular Brush pickup will begin on April 26<sup>th</sup> and will continue to be picked up on the last Thursday of each month, ending on October 25<sup>th</sup>, 2018. Brush is limited to three (3) foot lengths and no larger than four (4) inches in diameter. We request consideration on the amount of brush you put out. This service is meant for cleanup of your yard, not for entire tree removal. Please place brush out only on the last week of the month. With a clear and designated schedule our crew will be able to provide a more effective and safe removal process for our community.

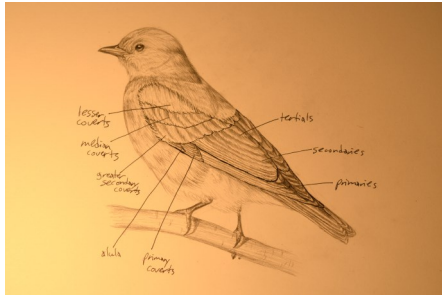

This colorful PowerPoint presentation includes the life history of the Eastern Bluebird, nest box management, other birds that nest in bluebird boxes, and more. The focus definitely is on bluebirds, but John also shares his passion for the natural world in hopes the audience will take away some broader and deeper messages about nature. Sprinkled throughout are just a few wildflowers, butterflies, other birds, and quotes by some of the great naturalists of the past. With sounds and visually beautiful

photographs, this program is of interest to anyone who appreciates nature.

John has maintained a trail of bluebird nest boxes in central NY for over 4 decades. He is a recognized authority on bluebird conservation, and has done slide programs and workshops for hundreds of organizations in 12 states and 2 Canadian provinces. He was a cofounder of the New York State Bluebird Society in 1982. He has received numerous awards for his bluebird conservation work, including the John and Norah Lane Bluebird Conservation Award from the North American Bluebird Society. In 2010 he was a recipient of the "Hero of Conservation" award from the Syracuse Post Standard. BA Biology, SUNY Oswego.

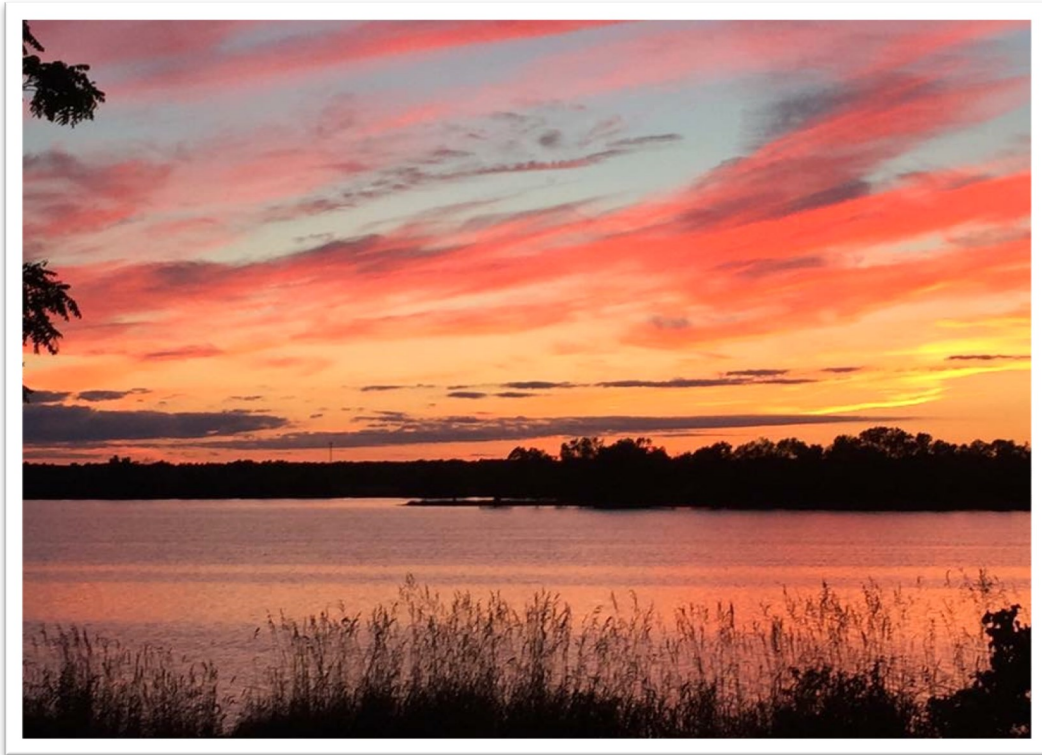
