Then and Now: Point Salubrious

One of the oldest houses in Lyme stands at Horton's Cove on Point Salubrious. James Horton is believed to have been the first settler on the point, arriving from Long Island in 1802. He purchased land from James Le Ray de Chaumont and by 1807 he'd built a log cabin. He prospered and was able to build this stone home by 1819. The home once contained elaborately carved woodwork and fireplace mantels built by a British soldier who'd deserted after the Battle of Sackets Harbor in the War of 1812. However, the house fell into disrepair in the 1880s and the roof collapsed, causing a great deal of interior damage. As a result, most of the original woodwork does not survive. A wooden third story was added sometime thereafter (see above), but in 1949 it was altered, and a large porch with columns was added.



John B. Rogers' grocery store was one of three grocery stores that used to stand on the Point. After Rogers and his wife Alice passed away, their daughter Bessie Byam inherited it. Later the store was purchased and run by Babe Sharlow. It originally stood about five doors east of its current spot, but it was moved after the store closed in the late 1950s or early 1960s. When the building was moved, it was rotated 90 degrees, so the side facing the road now is not the original storefront.

A Tribute to Reggie Schweitzer, Sr.



The picture above shows the face of the man who greeted children at Lyme Central School for over 19 years as they arrived to get on the bus each day. On Wednesday, April 4th the Lyme community lost a one of kind man, father, husband, grandfather and friend to many. Reggie was one of the most giving people anyone could ever meet. In 1875 Alvah Warner discovered mineral water while drilling a well near his home. He had the water analyzed by a pathologist from the New York Lunatic Asylum in Utica; this gentleman said it was saline sulphur water which would be cathartic for a number of ailments. He declared that drinking the water would be an excellent treatment for gout, rheumatism, and “engorgement of the liver;” he also said that if used externally, the water would treat “diseases of the skin.” By 1878 the Warner family had built the Warner House, a resort for those seeking the water’s cure. The house was later sold and renamed the Point Salubrious Club. The club was popular with fishermen in the 1890s, but by 1911 it was sold in foreclosure. Owner W.H. Moore donated the property to Trinity Church in 1915 and it was re-named the Trinity Club. In the 1930s the Jefferson County Tuberculosis and Public Health Committee used it as a children’s’ health camp. In 1938 it was re-opened as the Salubrious Inn restaurant. The building later fell into disrepair and was torn down.



“The Gordon girls” -- Chaumont sisters Myna, Laura, and Ruth -- built this cottage next to the Point Salubrious cemetery about 1913. The sisters called it “Dunmovin,” and used it as their summer home. Their niece inherited the cottage and it remains in the family today. This picture shows the Gordon sisters at Dunmovin with their dog, Trixie, probably in the 1930s.

Town of Lyme News

The Lyme Town Board and Highway Department has been busy early in this new year. It appears winter does not want to end, with an ice and sleet storm giving the highway crew a busy weekend in mid April.

At the April town board meeting, the Board approved hiring Hybrid Building Solutions as the contractor to build the new salt barn. The salt barn will be located on the town property next to the recreational fields. The total cost of the construction will be \$345,561 with \$262,500 coming from a grant from the Water Quality Improvement Program.

The Town Board also awarded the interior cleaning and painting of the Three Mile Bay Water Tower to Pittsburg Tank and Tower Maintenance Company for the low bid of \$75,190.

Highway Superintendent Pat Weston submitted a proposal to the board to offer property owners the option of installing new water systems themselves or hiring the Town to tap the main, install the curb stop, install the meter pit, install the second curb stop, install the meter and install the MXU. From the meter pit to the home would still be the responsibility of the property owner. The Board, with the recommendation of the Water Board, approved this proposal with the caveat that any contract signed with the property owner would show the current wage, equipment and material costs. The Town Board also approved the trade of the Highway Superintendents pickup truck in exchange for a newer model.

The seasonal mowing of the recreational fields, abandoned cemeteries and the Three Mile Bay Cemetery were awarded. Low bidder JW Property Services was awarded the contract to mow the recreational fields and abandoned cemeteries and Yard by Yard Property Services was the low bidder for the Three Mile Bay Cemetery.

The ongoing negotiations for the purchase of the Magee property has come to an end, as both Mr. Magee and the Town Board agreed upon the purchase price. The purchase, however, will still be determined by a Referendum Vote of registered town voters sometime in late June or July. The Board is in the process of gathering as much information as possible in an effort to educate you, the voting public, as to all the pros and cons of the purchase. Once completed, the information will be available on the town website, the Lyme Light and, most likely, through a special mailing. After which, an informational meeting will be held to answer any questions residents may have.

Sign ups for summer baseball, softball and T-Ball were completed. Volunteer coaches are still needed and anyone interested in coaching, or assisting the teams, should please contact Supervisor Aubertine.

Preparations for the Bicentennial Celebration are continuing nicely and excitement is growing in anticipation of the parade, carnival, concerts and the other numerous events that are planned. Organizations, clubs, school classes, businesses, churches and private individuals are encouraged to enter the parade with a float or some other entry. Additionally, those

groups, if not in the parade, can volunteer to plan, organize and operate some sort of game to be held in conjunction with the carnival. This can be a fund raising opportunity. Please contact Supervisor Aubertine if you want to be in the parade or operate a game.

The Town Board meets the second Wednesday of every month with meetings starting at 6:30 pm. You can also view the live streamed meetings on the town website or by going to Steve Weed Productions.

Lyme Heritage Center Opening Soon!

The Lyme Heritage Center is scheduled to open for the season on May 1st. Please come out to visit us at the old Grange Hall in Three Mile Bay. (There's no heat in the building, so you'll want to dress accordingly.)

Our first speaker of the season will discuss the Cranberry Creek encounter near Alexandria Bay between American and British forces. On July 14, 1813 a small group of American soldiers captured a British gunboat and took 69 prisoners. A force of 250 British soldiers and 4 gunboats pursued them. A running battle ensued until the British were forced to retreat. Come out to learn more about this little-known event in local history from expert Paul Beers on **Sunday, May 20th from 2 to 4**. He will discuss the battle and display artifacts from the War of 1812. After the presentation we'll have musical entertainment from The Shanty Shakers (Harvey Hewitt's band).

On **Sunday June 10th**, archaeologist Dr. Tim Abel will present "Recent Archaeology on the Pre-contact Iroquoian of Northern New York." In the late pre-contact period, from about A.D. 1300 until the early 1500s, northern New York was home to several clusters of Iroquoian villages and related sites.



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Chaumont's Centennial Time Capsule

The village of Chaumont was formed in 1874. In 1974, in celebration of the centennial, we decided to create a time capsule which the people of the village in 2074 would have the pleasure of opening. To make sure that the capsule would not be disturbed, it was placed in a column of concrete buried near the village office at the Chaumont Volunteer Fire Department building.

So, an excavation of about 5 ½ feet in depth was made, and a 2' by 2' form was placed in the hole, then back filled. The top of the column was to be level with the sidewalk. Gravel was brought in, concrete secured, and it was made ready for Memorial Day.

Many items had been collected for the capsule, including a copy of the Watertown Daily Times from May 21, 1975, a Chaumont telephone directory, the 1974 Lyme Central yearbook, a J.C. Penney catalogue, excerpts from the book of records of the village of Chaumont, a pair of pantyhose in an egg-shaped container (donated by Janice Comins), two copies of "Our Heritage" (a Chaumont history), and a ½ pint bottle which once contained peppermint schnapps (the centennial committee drank the schnapps).

Lee Fitzpatrick, who worked at Black Clawson, secured for us a very well built steel box, about 19" X 10" X 6", just perfect for the capsule. He brought the box to my home one evening so I could place the items in it.

It so happened that Ray & Isabelle Howard and Joe & Marie Johnson stopped at the house for coffee. Someone suggested that since I had the box and the items at hand, we should put them in then. We did, amid a great deal of talking and laughter. What a jovial evening!

When the box was full it was thought that if the concrete should crack, water might get in and ruin the items in it. So, since I had a bucket of roofing tar, we put plastic on the table and covered the box with tar and wrapped it well with plastic. The ladies did not like the smell of the tar and said so. They preferred the smell of the cookies, cheese and pie. My wife Marion always had them on hand. The capsule was ready to be buried.

Our burying celebration was on Memorial Day in 1975 (yes, the year following the actual centennial).

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Capital Improvements at the Alexander Copley House

The Lyme Community Foundation Board at its April meeting authorized the 2018 Capital Improvement Project with the goal of returning the exterior and grounds of the Copley House to its roots undertaking much needed and essential restoration. This exciting endeavor includes as its cornerstone the repair to the deteriorated wood exterior, and re-painting of the entire structure. This will be accomplished in concert with the classic design of the building and its Greek Revival architecture.

In addition the Foundation through the efforts of individual members has secured a State grant to offset the expense of paving the driveway and parking areas. Coupled with this will be the much needed drainage improvements to the beautiful lawn, which will allow the entire property to be utilized by the community year-round.

The final element of this Project will be the design and installation of the critical Life-Safety stairway at the rear of the building, allowing both access and egress for the full utilization of the Copley House second floor.

The funding of the work is to be through the Paving Grant, re-activation of the prior State Historic Grant where un-spent funds have been identified, a capital and maintenance reserve within the Foundation budget, along with a private donation.

The Hiram Copley House was built c. 1852 and is an example of the high-style Greek Revival architecture popular from around 1820-1860. The house is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is included in the Chaumont Historic district.

The Greek Revival style incorporated many of the architectural elements found on the classical Greek temples which were built during the height of the Greek Empire in the 5th century B.C.

The capital improvement project, which will begin as soon as the weather permits, will return our Copley House to its original grandeur. As was the custom with this style the exterior will be painted white. Originally the house had operable shutters on all the windows. It is the goal of the committee helping organize the project to restore those shutters in their original configuration.

The next issue of the Lyme Light News will feature an article highlighting the elements of Greek Revival style and will

explain how our very own Copley house reflects those values.

How a Group of Volunteers Preserved Chaumont's Old Fire Bell

An old bell stands next to the Chaumont Volunteer Fire Department. This is the bell that stood in a tower next to the Fire Department's original home on Horse Creek; it would be rung to alert the village in case of fire.

When a siren replaced it in 1931, the bell was stored in the old fire hall on Mill Street. It remained there until 1971, when a group of volunteers worked to put it on display at the new community hall and Fire Department site.

David Brass excavated for the base using the village backhoe. The Town of Lyme Highway Department contributed about four yards of gravel to make concrete for the base. The Fire Department bought the two barrels of cement used to make the concrete. James Cervini and I constructed the forms and mixed the concrete using the village mixer. The foundation was faced with flat stones collected from Jack Daniel's farm by Ray Howard.

The bell was then moved from Mill Street by the Township Telephone Company and placed where it is today. The support for the bell was painted black and the bell was painted bronze. Time has taken its toll and the foundation needs to be repainted, but Darwin Brown has volunteered to repaint the base. Once a volunteer, always a volunteer!

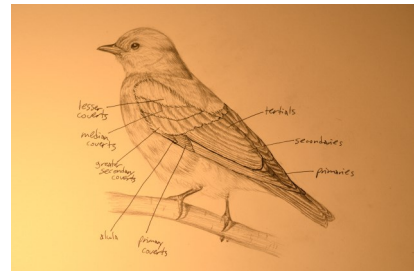

Chaumont's Centennial Time Capsule (cont'd)

There was a tremendous turnout, what with the school band, the American Legion color guard, and people from all over anxious to take part in this celebration. The first major event of the day was the dedication of a monument to the memory of Dr. Randolph Haas who had been physician over many years to the people of this area. He was well respected and well liked. The monument is located at the junction of Route 12E and the Old Town Springs Road.

Then we turned to placing the capsule in the column to rest for 100 years. About 8 inches of soft concrete was mixed and dumped in the form. Larry Comins, the mayor, and I used ropes to lower the capsule into the concrete and more concrete, like a slurry, was dumped on the box and the form filled to the top. On the top an aluminum plaque was placed which instructs the people to bring the capsule up for viewing. It should be interesting to see how the column will be pulled from the ground as it will weigh about 1 1/2 to 2 tons.

No doubt they have to use a sledgehammer to break the concrete. Opening the box will be no picnic.
