We also sell eight collections of articles by local newspaper writer Ernest Cook. Here's an example of one of his articles, which was published on August 8, 1930:

"Reverend Mr. Knapp is a preacher who feels he ought to preach a sermon to put a curb on the mad rush the women are in to follow the fashions. So we are just in time to hear it. Of course we never thought these pioneer mothers were inclined to be foolish in the chase after dame fashion. But it seems by the preacher that they were. That was the day of the slated corsets that were worn more than a girdle. In the days before whalebone got into the first row in the making of corsets. In those days slim slats of wood with a back - bone, side - bone, at the front-bone of the corsets. So the minister looking out over his audience makes the corset as his chief theme in his sermon against fashion ways. Of course he

mentioned personal adornment but he could hardly make much of that in the pioneer community. So he put his vent on the corset and told the ladies in the audience that it was a shame the way they were following this barbaric custom. Why, he stated, there are enough corset boards in this audience to shingle a henhouse. It was a great sermon. That was a century ago and we think of those pioneer women among the best of our early settlers. But the daughters of those women and their granddaughters, as well as their great, great granddaughters, have come in for their share of scolding from preachers here and there for some fad they chance to be following at the time. And it has been ever thus.

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

The holidays are over and if you're not too tired and up for a challenge, it's time to take care of your seasonal houseplants.

Poinsettia


- In March, cut stems back within 4 to 6 inches of the soil, repot.
- When new growth appears, place in a sunny window.
- Continue to water when the soil surface becomes dry to the touch. Fertilize every 2 weeks with a dilute fertilizer solution.
- Late May acclimate the plant to the outdoors by placing it in a shady, protected area for 2-3 days, then gradually expose it to longer periods of direct sun.
- Once hardened (7-10 days), dig a hole in an area that receives 6-8 hours of sunlight and set the pot in the ground.
- Pinch or cut off the shoot tips once or twice from late June to mid-August. Continue to water and fertilize.
- Mid-September, bring the plant indoors. Place in bright sunny window.
- To get the poinsettia to flower for Christmas, it must receive complete darkness from 5:00 PM to 8:00 AM daily from early October to early December. Protect the plant from light by placing it in a closet or covering it with a box. During the remainder of the day, the plant should be in a sunny window.

Amaryllis

- After the flowers fade, cut off the flower stalk (1-2 inches above the bulb) with a sharp knife. Don't harm the foliage. The long leaves make food, which is stored in the bulb.
- Place the plant in a sunny window, water when soil surface becomes dry.
- Fertilize every 2-4 weeks with houseplant fertilizer.
- Move outdoors in late May, early June. Acclimate the plant outdoors for a few days.
- Once hardened, dig a hole in an area that receives partial to full sun. Set pot into the ground. Water during dry weather. Fertilize once or twice a month through July.

- Mid- to late September, bring plant indoors. Amaryllis bulbs need to rest before blooming.
- To induce dormancy, place plant in a cool, semi-dark location and stop watering in late September/early October.
- Cut off foliage when leaves dry and turn brown.
- Place pot in a dry location with temperature of 45 to 55F, allow bulb to rest for 2-3 months.
- After several weeks of rest, check the bulb for signs of new growth. When a bud or new foliage appears, place plant in a warm, bright location. If repotting is necessary, do so before watering. (<https://hortnews.extension.iastate.edu>)

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Lyme Food Pantry

Back tracking a bit, the Lyme Food Pantry during fall harvest was able to supply fresh vegetables, especially from residents' gardens and the Cape Vincent Correctional Center's Garden. At our pantry's door arrived tomatoes, peppers, zucchini, potatoes, lettuce, carrots, celery, squash, apples, watermelon. Sure wish we had some fresh now!

Food budgets are stretched but during the months of August, September and October the pantry filled over 90 orders. Thanks to all of you sending items from your own pantries, purchasing while shopping for yourselves and/or giving monetary donations.

For Thanksgiving with 10 donated frozen turkeys, the Pantry was able to give out complete food for dinners with all the trimmings. An anonymous donation also supplied 25 Blue Heron takeout turkey dinners to Bayview Apartment residents and several other community members.

The Christmas Giveaway as always, was a marvelous, exciting and busy time. The church building was stocked like a warehouse and bustling with many volunteers packing bags and bags and bags of food (fresh, frozen, and canned), along with toiletries, cleaning supplies and of course, gifts for the children. Then on December 18th there was the drive through and deliveries to receive all the goodies.

Once again because of the generosity of this community, it's residents, and business, the Lyme Pantry is able to truly assist those in need.

relationships that make Lyme Central a great place to learn and work! Teamwork, now more than ever is essential to the District's overall long term success!




It's that time of year again!

The Village would like to remind all property owners and occupants that they are responsible for sidewalk snow removal. It is especially important that residents who are or plan to be absent during the winter months make arrangements for the clearing of their sidewalks.



This is required by the Village of Chaumont ***Property Maintenance Code; Section 63.6 Maintenance of Buildings and Structures:***

No owner or occupant of a lot or building shall allow or permit steps, sidewalks or parking spaces on the lot to fall into disrepair in such a manner as to make it unsafe for normal use and weather conditions. With respect to sidewalks, it is recognized that sidewalks are utilized by the public and it is each owner's or occupant's responsibility to keep the sidewalk in good repair and free of hazards.
