Where Are My Legs?

There are all kinds of legs or supports for many things: animals, structures and plants including trees. Without the proper underpinnings things can fall over: people, buildings and plants.

During the past 25 years various local groups including the Lyme Garden Club, Lyme Tree Committee, and the DEC in the form of a very generous grant have established a tree canopy along the formerly bare main street corridor. The trees are doing what they're designed to do: provide shade, reduce energy costs, serve as a windbreak, and improve the aesthetics of our town.

It's an all too common practice to cut off the bottom branches of the Colorado Spruce trees that have been carefully planted to serve as a buffer against the harsh winds coming off the lake.

The idea is that mowing the grass will be easier.

The result is that the tops become too heavy under the weight of snow, so the tree starts leaning and eventually falls over. Each Spruce costs about \$500 to install not including the hours necessary in caring for it until it gets established.

If you are the lucky owner of one of these magnificent trees, please leave the bottom branches intact. Cutting their legs off will cause them to fall over and die. We have already lost at least five trees due to improper pruning. The trees and members of the groups that have worked hard to plant and care for them thank you.

An example of a Quill article follows:

Lyme Garden Club

"The garden suggests there might be a place where we can meet nature halfway." - Michael Pollan

Let's face it, lawns take a lot of work. They need plenty of water, regular mowing and require fertilizer. Fertilizers wash off of lawns, into storm sewers and eventually flow into our lakes and rivers. The herbicides contaminate the water we drink and poison the fish we eat. Removing some or even most of the lawn has a lot of benefits-besides the environmental and health reasons, there's less time spent on mowing and less money spent on lawn care. Plus, we would save large quantities of natural resources by reducing our need for water and gasoline.

There are several low-maintenance lawn alternatives for different areas of your yard to consider:

- No-mow lawns are the product of seeds designed to require little or no water or mowing once established. Typically these lawns are a mix of fine fescue grasses which are a cool season grass which is tolerant of heat, drought and shade. They are also disease resistant.
- Clover is extremely tough and thrives in sun to partial shade. It will endure some foot traffic. Clover is sweet-scented, inexpensive and quite durable. It grows in any kind of soil and stays green even during low-water periods. Clover only needs to be mowed a few times a year and the seed is highly affordable.
- Moss is good for moist, shady areas with acidic soil. Moss lawns are drought tolerant and don't require mowing or fertilizer. Small moss lawns can absorb more carbon dioxide than 275 mature trees and produce a ton of oxygen. (www.theoxygenproject.com)


Our lawns provide virtually no habitat for pollinators or other animals. If restoring and protecting the environment is important to you, consider alternatives to the typical lawn and make your yard a haven for wildlife. (www.neavegroup.com, www.ggwash.org)



OBI Land Trust update

The Chaumont-based OBI Land Trust had a summer full of success and progress that included a new conservation easement property in Henderson, improvements to Downybrook Nature Reserve in Brownville and yet another well-attended annual fundraiser at Wise Guys Ristorante.

OBI's newest conservation property is 243 acres off Gilman Road in the northeast portion of Henderson. The land is owned by Stephen W. Yaussi and includes a vast hardwood forest and several hundred feet of "rocky ridge" – a high bluff with sheer limestone cliffs that are a local landmark for those driving along Route 3 in Henderson or boating in Henderson or White's Bay. The easement was finalized in August and means the land will be forever wild and protects it from most development.

OBI's annual fundraiser, "Looking into the Future: Conserving Land for Next Generations" was attended by more than 100 guests at Wise Guys and put a spotlight on various young people who have contributed to improvements at OBI conservation properties. Members of the Youth Philanthropy Council of the Northern New York Community Foundation and area Boy Scouts were celebrated for their various contributions to OBI through spring clean-up events and construction of bridges and walkovers at Downybrook.

Downybrook is located on Perch Lake Road in Brownville and this summer had several exciting improvements thanks to a \$38,782 grant to OBI from the New York State Partnership Program. The money helped fund a new nature viewing deck near the grassland area on the reserve's west side as well as a new access road and parking area at the east entrance. Both projects are completed and will enhance the experience for visitors to the reserve, which is open year-round.

Brownville, Henderson and Lyme are part of an 8-town service area for OBI Land Trust that includes the shoreline communities of Jefferson County. 


